Hello, FCS Family!



Double brood of cicadas set to create big buzz this spring.

Anna Vaughn-Doom, a biology professor at West Kentucky Community and Technical College, said this year's emergence of two cicada broods will be history in the making.

Millions to billions of cicadas are expected to emerge this spring nationwide, including in Kentucky, according to an entomologist in the state.

Normally, groups of cicadas, called broods, don't overlap in emergence, but this year two will emerge at the same time. People will be able to hear them when they arrive. Entomologist Jonathan Larson with University of Kentucky Entomology said the song will be as loud as a jet engine. The male cicadas join together and sing a loud chorus to mate. Larson said in April or May people will know the cicadas have arrived. "By and large, it's not a problem," said Larson. "It's just something that's happening around us. It's a reminder of the pageantry of nature. It can be very beautiful if you allow for that in your heart."

Home & Environment

Anna Vaughn-Doom, a biology professor at West Kentucky Community and Technical College, said the double brood emergence will be history in the making. "Historical events are neat, things that you're not necessarily going to see again in a lifetime is valuable," said Vaughn-Doom. "Here we are, we're coming up on the eclipse, and then we're also going to see and hear these cicadas."

The double brood emergence will happen in places as far east as New Jersey and as far south as Louisiana. To see a map from the U.S. Forest Service that shows where the cicadas will be, visit fs.usda.gov/features/cicadas-stir-ruckus.

More Bugs

Speaking of bugs, with warmer weather coming I would like to share my ant killer recipe. Please keep this away from children or pets. I found this to be very helpful to place it where the line of ants is coming into the house. It does attract ants initially, but then they take it to their nest and the ants start to disappear.

Ant killer recipe

1 cup of sugar Stir to combine, then spoon on ant line

½ cup of water Do not use more borax than recipe calls

1tablespoon of borax Keep away from children and pets

News Release from University of Kentucky Martin-Gatton School of Agriculture Public Relations—April 1, 2024

Spokesperson for the Martin-Gatton School of Agriculture, Lirpa Loof, announced last week the changing of the University of Kentucky school mascot, the Wildcat, will be replaced by the mighty Boilermaker. It was decided that the Boilermaker mascot better represented the history of Kentucky and its iron making industry during the 18th and early 19th century. The first iron making operation began in 1791, before Kentucky was a state. Both eastern Kentucky and Bourbon County areas produced raw material for household goods, supplying munitions used in the War of 1812, and industrial parts. Miss Loof reported that at one time, Kentucky was the 3rd largest producer of iron in the country, making the Boilermaker the perfect mascot for the University, reflecting the importance and strength of the iron workers and boilermakers. Western Kentucky also had iron furnaces located in what is now the Land Between the Lakes area. No comment from Purdue University at announcement and publication.

Have you noticed any wild asparagus growing around your farm or yard? It is asparagus season, try this yummy recipe for a different taste of asparagus.

- ¾ pound fresh asparagus
- 1/4 cup chicken or vegetable broth
- 1 tablespoon lite soy sauce
- 1/2 teaspoon ground ginger
- · 1 clove garlic, minced
- 1/4 teaspoon black pepper
- 1 teaspoon cornstarch
- 4 green onions
- 2 Roma tomatoes
- 11/2 cups fresh mushrooms
- 1 tablespoon olive oil
- 1. Trim asparagus and cut into 1 inch pieces.
- Combine broth, soy sauce, ginger, garlic, pepper and cornstarch in a small bowl to make sauce.
- **3. Chop** green onions and tomatoes into ½ inch pieces. **Slice** mushrooms.


- Pour oil into a wok or large skillet and preheat over medium-high heat.
- Add asparagus and green onions; stir-fry 4 minutes.
- Add mushrooms; stir-fry 1 additional minute or until asparagus is tender-crisp.
- Push vegetables to the outer sides of the wok. Add sauce in center, cook until thick and bubbly. Add tomatoes.
- 8. Stir well and heat through.

Yield: 4, ¾ cup servings.

Nutritional Analysis: 70 calories, 4 g fat, 0.5 g saturated fat, 0 mg cholesterol, 210 mg sodium, 7 g carbohydrate, 2 g fiber, 3 g sugars, 3 g protein.

Solar Eclipse Safety

When watching the partial phases of the solar eclipse directly with your eyes, which happens before and after totality, you must look through safe solar viewing glasses ("eclipse glasses") or a safe handheld solar viewer at all times. Eclipse glasses are NOT regular sunglasses; regular sunglasses, no matter how dark, are not safe for viewing the Sun. <u>Safe solar viewers</u> are thousands of times darker and ought to comply with the <u>ISO 12312-2</u> international standard. NASA does not approve any particular brand of solar viewers.

Always inspect your eclipse glasses or handheld viewer before use; if torn, scratched, or otherwise damaged, discard the device. Always supervise children using solar viewers. Do NOT look at the Sun through a camera lens, telescope, binoculars, or any other optical device while wearing eclipse glasses or using a handheld solar viewer —


